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Open Doors: A Message from Our Leadership

Dear Friends,

2018-2019 was a great year! Interfaith Hospitality Network of the Main Line opened many doors this year – some doors were new, and some were old that were re-opened. Each door offered opportunities that resulted in our continued progress and advancement towards our mission.

Several doors led to important capacity improvements. We added a full-time Program Manager staff position that is improving our quality of care; improved the look and functionality of the office and Day Center; developed and launched a

strategic plan that is guiding our growth efforts; strengthened our partnership with Your Way Home Montgomery County; and increased our pool of private and public donors. These advancements will have a lasting impact on IHN-ML, securing our sustainability and continued progress.

Our most important accomplishment, of course, was the 15 families we served. Twenty-five children and eighteen adults received safe, compassionate, and client-centered emergency shelter. Their average length of stay was 78 days, beating our 90-day target. Families like Susanne and her son, who became

homeless after an unexpected injury left Susanne unable to work. Lacking income and support, they lost their apartment and quickly found themselves living in Susanne's car. "You have provided my son and me with safety, food, guidance, and a path to housing. I know where we will sleep each night, and my son can get to school on time." Susanne is a hard worker and has renewed hope for economic stability and independent housing.

All this good work would not be possible without you. Over 1,200 volunteers helped this year by

setting up/taking down family bedrooms, cooking evening meals, reading to children, sleeping overnight, or assisting at the office and Day Center. You contributed over 13,000 hours supporting our families and working towards ending family homelessness. Thank you for your commitment!

Each year brings new and innovative ways to work with and guide families to economic self-sufficiency and housing success. As a member organization of Family Promise, IHN-ML is committed to excellence and national best practices. Nationally,

we have contributed to the collective impact of the Family Promise network, serving 126,000 homeless people. Locally, we have contributed to the collective impact of a 47% reduction of homelessness through our partnership with Your Way Home Montgomery County. Referrals, intakes, connections services have improved, advancing our collective efforts towards our ultimate goal of making homelessness rare, brief, and non-reoccurring. These numbers

promising, and there is still much work to be done.

For the past 28 years, IHN-ML has opened its doors and provided keys for housing success for families experiencing homelessness, thanks to your support. We continue to need every partner for this critical work: individuals, businesses, foundations, government, our interfaith community, and many more. Thank you for standing by us and opening your door to ending homelessness, one family at a time.

Our Mission

The Interfaith Hospitality Network of the Main Line enables volunteers from local congregations and the broader community to provide compassion and temporary shelter for homeless families. IHN-ML's programs and services connect the families to community resources, empowering them to achieve and maintain affordable housing.

Our Values Statement

Our services and programs empower families to achieve housing stability. They are personcentered, strength-based, flexible, and offered equally to all.

Ending Homelessness One Family at a Time.

Programs

We are part of a countywide effort to make homelessness rare, brief, and non-recurring. Since 2014, when the Your Way Home collective was first established, homelessness in Montgomery County has decreased by 47%. IHN-ML contributes to this successful outcome by utilizing a trauma-informed housing first model that includes low-barrier emergency shelter and intensive case management designed to help families quickly regain, and then maintain, their housing.

Emergency Shelter



Our partnering host congregations provide private sleeping accommodations for a week at a time paired with volunteers who deliver a daily dinner and companionship.

Every day, our Transportation Manager drives families to and from our host congregations and our Day Center where families have access to basic needs, like

laundry, showers, and Internet access. Families also meet with our case manager to work on their housing goals.





Case Management



All adults receive on-going person-centered case management to work on the goals of their Housing Stability Plan, which employs Housing First best practices, and includes supports necessary to achieving and maintaining housing, such as employment, childcare, transportation,

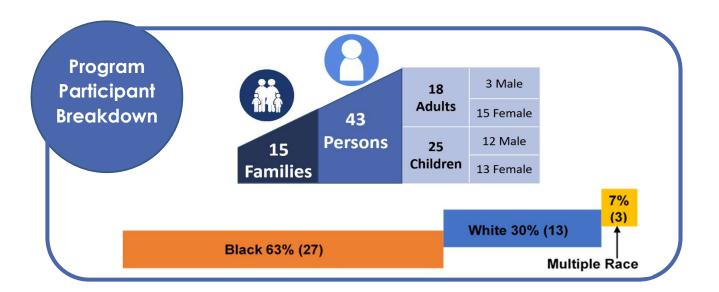
and health care. Our team approach with partnering community resources helps families improve their awareness of and connectivity to community supports that they can continue to access as needed once they are permanently housed. While safely sheltered with IHN-ML, many families are able to concentrate on saving money and increasing their income; when they exit, they receive short term financial support to help maintain their housing and bridge potential wage gaps as they continue to take important steps that will build their income.

Program Reach and Impact





100% of families connected for the first time to 2 or more public/private benefits.



93% of families increased or maintained their income while in the program.



60% of the families that exited had even greater income increase within 60 days of exit.

100% families that participated in programs last year have either found a permanent housing solution or are still participating in the program.

9 of 13 families exited directly to a permanent housing solution, the other 4 worked through partner programs to obtain permanent housing.

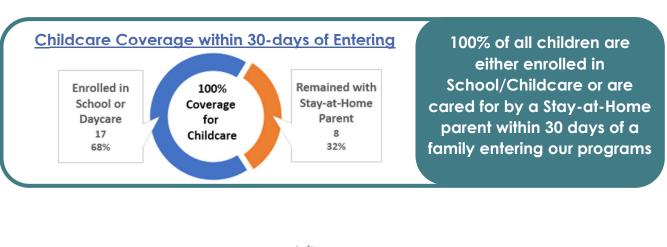

The Rivera Family Journey

Imagine losing all of your possessions, hearing that your home is uninhabitable, moving to an unfamiliar city, not speaking the native language, and being told by your family, the only people you thought you could depend on, that you need to leave their home.

This is precisely the position that the Rivera family found themselves in when they arrived on the doorsteps of Interfaith Hospitality Network of the Main Line. Heartbroken, afraid, and in need of

emergency shelter, the Rivera family carried their tattered bags into the IHN-ML Day Center; yet, even in this moment of desperation, they expressed gratitude for having a safe place to stay.

Despite language barriers, caring volunteers immediately helped the Rivera's feel safe by extending hospitality, preparing them a room, sharing a warm meal, and providing Spanish speaking interpreters to help facilitate communication.

After a good night's sleep, the Rivera family met with IHN-ML's Program Manager to develop a plan of action to move from homelessness to permanent housing. They faced seemingly insurmountable challenges – no identification, no income, no insurance, and no access to a consistent source of food.

While safely sheltered, the Rivera family worked intensely with case management to rebuild their lives. They had many goals in addition to being in their own home - they wanted to learn to speak English, find employment, obtain their driver's licenses, and purchase a car. To reach these goals, they needed to connect with numerous public and private resources, beginning with cash assistance and food. Through intensive case management, the Rivera Family gained access to these services, as well as much needed medical services. They also learned how to navigate public transportation, they applied for identification, and they developed budgeting skills. Most importantly, the Rivera family was immediately referred to the Your Way Home Rapid Re-Housing Program; this would eventually become their gateway to permanent housina.

The Rivera family was introduced to a local private property owner who was impressed with their determination. At that moment, everything started to fall into place. The landlord spoke Spanish and was able to explain that he had an apartment for rent in the very school district they had lived in before becoming homeless. After spending weeks searching for housing, the Rivera family was overjoyed and felt that they were led to exactly where they were meant to be. This landlord's compassionate and generous heart connected immediately with the Rivera family, and he shared with IHN-ML that he and his family wanted to find a way to bless this family beyond only accepting their housing application. Imagine how surprised the family was when they came to sign their lease and found a new sofa, a new kitchen table and chair set, and a bathroom fully outfitted with towels and accessories. Tears flowed at the lease signing as family connections were made and hope was restored.

Months later, fear has dissipated, and joy and pride fill the Rivera family home. There are still hard days, but with new skills, new supports, and hope restored, the Rivera family continues to grow and learn. Today, they are permanently housed, attending school regularly, driving, and participating in ESL classes. All four family members are employed and are looking for ways to give back to their community.

This is the mission of the Interfaith Hospitality Network of the Main Line. Together with donors, volunteers, and staff, we are ending homelessness, one family at a time.

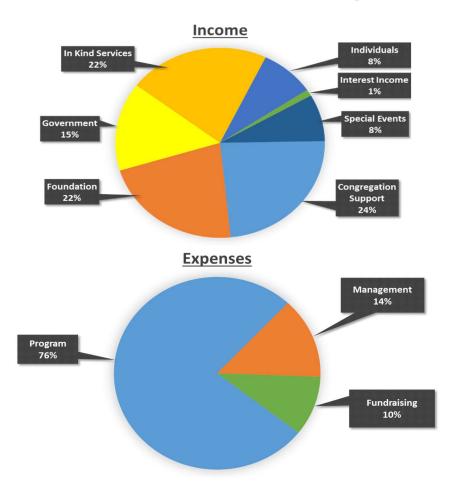
